This single phrase is one of the most popular among Christians and the Church today, and for a good reason. Not too many people know the true value of the Word of God, for if they did, they would be cramming as much of it as possible into their minds.

One thing a person must know is that the Bible is no mere book. Yeah, jabba jabba habba. You've probably heard messages on the importance of the Bible a million times. But have you stopped and really thought about the power of God's Word? How it governs whole nations, brings hope to the hopeless, impacts thousands through different messages, and drives demons away? Bible memorization is key in understanding the Word. When we hide God's Word in our hearts, we are allowing its power to work in our lives. The Word is a living creature that encompasses the souls of people and points them in God's direction. ## Serving the Local Church

It's nice being a pew warmer. You can just show up to church Sunday morning, even a few minutes late if you're dragging your feet, take your seat in the crowd, listen to the sermon, sing some songs, and go home to your lunch without a second thought. It's quite convenient when you can just sit back, be blessed, and let everyone else do the work. And that's precisely what millions of Christians do.

I want to suggest a different way, that we as young people become involved in serving the local church. I could speak about the importance of being committed to a church, but I want to focus more on being an active part of the church you attend. There's more to being part of a church than just having your name on the membership roll or dropping your offering in the collection plate, although these are important as well. There's work to do to make everything run smoothly and I think it's great if we can become a part of that.

When I read about the early church, I never get the idea that when the believers met together, that there were just a few select people running the show. Rather, it seems to me there was involvement on everyone's part. Galatians 6:10 (ESV) says "So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, especially to those who are of the household of faith." One of the ways that we can do good to one another is by

serving each other within our church.

Very often, there are many ways in which we can serve, we just don't realize it. Sometimes, that's because the work goes on behind the scenes and not many people know or think about it. Just recently, I joined the cleaning team at my church. It's not often that you go to church and think about how clean and tidy the facility is. Nobody's going to stand up on Sunday morning and applaud me for the awesome job I did on cleaning the toilets, but I don't doubt that people will start complaining if they ever got really dirty because that's just gross. Sometimes it's easier to notice a job not done than one that's well done.

Depending on what kind of church you attend, there will be different areas you can get involved in. Some of them will be clearly seen by men, others will not. There are positions like leading worship, playing piano, helping with a Sunday school class, ushering, running the library or kitchen and helping in the nurs-

ery. These are great areas for young people to get involved in. In our church, we've also had young men in their late teens and early twenties teaching the adult Sunday school class. Of course, this requires spiritual maturity and the ability to confidently speak in front of a crowd, but it's great to see them learning to minister at a young age.

There are other things that happen more behind the scenes that are equally important. Cleaning was one that I already spoke about. The church grounds also have to be maintained, the grass cut, gardening done, and the parking lot cleared in the winter. Chances are that within your church, there are people who are doing this regularly without your knowing it, or in my church, if there's a big yard project to be done, it will be announced and they get a large group to come out one day and help. There may also be different events throughout the week that you can help with. Like I said, depending on your church, there will be different areas to serve, so don't be afraid to do something.

Whether they're still in school or working part-time (like me), many young people have extra time on their hands to practically serve their local church. If you're not sure where help is needed, don't be afraid to ask someone. It's likely that there are individuals overlooking different facets of ministry and a leader in your congregation should be able to direct you to them. Yes, it may mean sacrificing a few free hours out of your week or coming to church earlier or staying later. My experience, however, has been that I'm blessed serving my church, even if it isn't that glamorous. Use your time and talents to serve and I don't doubt that you will be blessed too.



## Insights through Hebrew

## A LOOK AT GOD'S WILL FOR YOUTH

The following is a statement of blessing: Psalm 144:12 "That our sons may be as plants grown up in their youth; that our daughters may be as pillars, Sculptured in palace style"

English: We whose sons are as plants grown up in their youth; whose daughters are as cornerpillars carved after the fashion of a palace;

What does it mean to be sons grown up in our youth? What does it mean to be daughters who are sculptured palace pillars? As youth, that is what we should be. But what does that mean?

In Jewish culture and society, a boy is bar-mitz-vah-ed at the age of 13. A girl is bat-mitzvah-ed at the age of 12. Bar mitzvah is a coming-of-age milestone where a child is now considered an adult. This tradition came about during the middle ages.

Bar mitzvah means "son of the commandment". A bar mitzvah is now regarded as man, and can testify in court. A bar mitzvah is responsible for

his own actions. Previously, parents were held responsible for a child's misdemeanor. Now the Bar Mitzvah, an adult, can be held responsible for his own actions. A child is not required to fast on certain holidays, an adult is. A Bar Mitzvah is one who is counted among men in the synagogue count. A Bar Mitzvah makes a lifelong commitment to be a son of the commandment, to study the Torah, and to live an observant life according to the ethics and traditions of his community. His delight is in the Torah of His God, and in this Torah he will meditate day and night (Psalm 1).

"Plants grown up in their youth" paints a portrait of young men. Plants really grown up have impressive stature. They flourish, they bear fruit, they continue to grow, and they gradually become a strong tree. The Hebrew word for son (ben) means, "Builder of the family name", a son should not and cannot be the "cause of the family's shame". Clearly these sons are after the order of true "Bar Mitzvahs", mature beyond their age. In their youth they are already grown up, "wise beyond their years". They reject the concept of "teenagers" but rather are men. Bar Mitzvahs are not given full rights and privileges of a man immediately, they first learn responsibility. This is God's way. So often we teenagers want our privileges but shy away from responsibility first. In God's ways, responsibility comes before privileges, submission before authority, suffering before glory, and faith before fulfillment. These sons are trustworthy; they are counted among men.

Yeshua (Jesus ) was a picture of the most faithful, obedient, son the world has ever seen. He was so submitted to the will of God. He knew His Father's heart. He knew His Father's will, and He sought for the glory of His Father. Read John 17, look at the way He talks to His Father. Read Luke 2:40-52. What kind of son He was to His earthly parents? Yeshua was not just a son of the commandment, He was the epitome and personification of the commandment; He was the commandment of God in flesh. He was a plant so grown up before even reaching the age of Bar Mitzvah. He had the wisdom that was from above, that astounded the wise men of the day. He was a builder of His Father's name. No one knows God like Yeshua, no one, could ever, in himself, be such a son as Yeshua.

David is another example of a son "grown up in his youth'. David sought after God with all his heart. God took him out of the sheepfold, where he was a faithful shepherd, and made him king over all Israel. God chose him, because God saw his heart. David was a man after God's own heart, meaning that he really sought to have the heart of God. David certainly loved God with all his heart. As a youth he was not concerned about his own name, but the name of YHWH. He was zealous for YHWH's name. He was a real leader, who would lay down his life for his sheep. Read John 10.

As a young man standing before Goliath, David didn't concerned himself with "my life, my protection, my glory, my rights", rather, "God's glory, God's people, God's name, God's honor". That is why he laid down his life before God and God used him to defeat the enemies

of Israel.

The Book of Samuel records again and again that as a youth, David, when he went out with the army of Saul, behaved wisely. David is another example of a true Bar Mitzvah who obeys God's commandments; especially the greatest of all and that is to love God. David is an example of a son who is grown up in his youth. He knew what it meant in Deuteronomy 30:14 when YHWH said, "But the word is very nigh unto thee, in thy mouth, and in thy heart, that thou mayest do it."

- (1 Samuel 18:5 KJV) And David went out whithersoever Saul sent him, and behaved himself wisely: and Saul set him over the men of war, and he was accepted in the sight of all the people, and also in the sight of Saul's servants.
- (1 Samuel 18:14 KJV) And David behaved himself wisely in all his ways; and the LORD was with him.
- (1 Samuel 18:15 KJV) Wherefore when Saul saw that (David) behaved himself very wisely, he was afraid of him.
- (1 Samuel 18:30 KJV) Then the princes of the Philistines went forth: and it came to pass, after they went forth, that David behaved himself more wisely than all the servants of Saul; so that his name was much set by.

Visualizing daughters that are corner pillars paints a picture of strong young women, daughters of virtue and excellence; empowered women. These daughters are polished – refined, carved, and vital to the function and structure of the "palace". These wise and mature daughters are precise, without "rough spots", wise,

of higher standard (not common stuff), erect, a pillar of fortitude and strength, not "wishywashy", not frivolous, not self-seeking, but noble (of high moral standing, upstanding). These are daughters that play their part and are content in their position, meek, and humble, yet key in the role they play.

Read Luke Chapter 1, especially vs.38 and 46-54. Mary (Miryam), mother of Yeshua, was an excellent example of such a woman. She played her part well. She had a true servant's heart. I believe such daughters have an attitude of humility and spirit of a servant. God's will for daughters is that they be "handmaidens" of His for His use, just like Mary. Whose welfare and honor was she thinking of? The LORD's (YHWH's). She was not concerned about her own reputation. Rather, she said, "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word.". Here is a woman humble, meek, lowly, and submitted to the command of God, concerned with His reputation, His goodness, and His glory. Mary was a maidservant like Hagar, Zilpah, and Bilhah, who bore sons not for themselves. Theirs was a lowly, sore, existence as maidservants not by choice, but Mary chose and submitted himself to the will of God.

Shiphrah and Puah, Hebrew midwives during Israel's slavery in Egypt, were wise and feared YHWH. They were noble, virtuous women, who did not save their own lives at the expense of their people, but instead served God by refusing to kill the Hebrew baby boys. Naaman's servant girl was mightily used by YHWH. Instead of being bitter about her circumstances, she told Naaman that Elisha could heal his leprosy. Huldah, a housewife, was sought after by the King of Judah and the High Priests for counsel. She opened her mouth, saying, "Thus

says YHWH..." These are more examples of women who were like pillars.

Those are high standards, "ideals" you may say. When I compare myself to either to the descriptions, how do I measure up? Indeed, "Happy is that people, that is in such a case: yea, happy is that people, whose God is the YHWH."

Hebrews 11:13-16 (NKJV)- These all died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off were assured of them, embraced [them] and confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth. For those who say such things declare plainly that they seek a homeland. And truly if they had called to mind that country from which they had come out, they would have had opportunity to return. But now they desire a better, that is, a heavenly country. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for He has prepared a city for them.

Are you looking for a better country? Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, and Rahab were, and so were many other people, both in the Bible and in

more recent times. It troubles me that so many who label themselves Christians today do not act much differently from nonbelievers. Is Christianity only about being a little bit better than the rest of the world? Or why don't these people desire to live more like Jesus?

Christians are becoming less and less Christlike because they are looking at the country that is physically around them. And that world is difficult to ignore. But the world around us is not where we ought to look. When we accepted Jesus, as I will explain further later in this book, we died to that world. We gave up our citizenship in it. We traded it for citizenship in a heavenly country.

People from other countries are easy to spot. First of all, they look different. They are taller

or shorter, and may have different skin color and facial features. It is often difficult to understand what they are saying, or if they have learned English well, they have distinct accents. Living in the United States doesn't change that. If a man from China lives here for fifty years, he will still be different from the stereotypical American.

Some foreigners come to the United States because they want to adopt it as their new native country. Those people try to learn about the country, and they spend time with Americans so they can become somewhat more like us, and at least function in our world. Some foreigners do not want to live in the United States. They want to go home when whatever business takes them here is over. These spend time with other people from their country and are not focused on fitting in with us. They observe us and spend some time meeting us, but they do not become one of us. They are focused on a different country. That is the kind of foreigners we should be in this world.

Heaven can be hard to focus on. The Chinese have been to China, the Germans to Germany. They know exactly how things work in their countries, and have tangible proof that their countries were there, and thus will be there when they go back. We have to have faith.

John 20:29- Jesus said to him, "Thomas, because you have seen Me, you have believed. Blessed [are] those who have not seen and [yet] have believed."

When Jesus was raised from the dead, Thomas did not believe it right away. If you are a Christian, you believe that Jesus has risen from the dead. You believe that the Bible is completely

true. The Bible says that heaven exists. There is a heavenly country. If you want to look up verses to be sure, try Matthew 8:11, John 14:2 and Revelation 3:12 and 21:2.

The list in Hebrews 11 gives us many examples of people who acted without knowing what would happen in the future. They trusted God's promises, His care for them, His knowledge of the future, and His character. Then they acted in the ways they knew were right.

Most of the people in Hebrews 11 were told directly by God what they should do. Though that does not happen today, we have the Bible, which tells us how we should act. Not all the acts in the Bible were accomplished because God appeared or sent a dream or an angel to talk to someone. A lot of times, He accomplished things through people who were just doing the things they knew were right. Joseph wasn't told expressly to travel to Egypt. He was taken there as a slave, but it was what he did while he was there that made a difference. He could have pitied himself and neglected his duties, but He honored God instead, because he trusted Him. Esther wasn't told by God to go to the king. In fact, she was not even assured of living when she went, but she did anyway, to save the lives of God's people.

I want to spend my life living by the standards of the heavenly country that we are citizens of, and I pray that you do too. They are totally different than the standards this world operates on; in fact, they are often the opposite. What kind of a country requires that you die in order to live (Romans 8:13) and be a slave to gain your freedom (I Corinthians 7:21), and allows you to be strong when you are weak (II Corinthians 12:10)? That's right, it's our country, and I'm so thankful that it is!
